Europe Endless is a 25-minute documentary filmed in the Republic of Ireland, Northern Ireland and Pittsburgh, USA. It is the output of a research project developed as a response to the European Union Referendum Act 2015. In August 2016, in the knowledge that the status of the border between the Republic of Ireland and the United Kingdom would come to be central to the Brexit debate and negotiations, a research team consisting of Walter Stabb, Prof. Colin MacCabe, artist filmmakers Christopher Roth and Jeanne Tremsal and Dr. Robyn Jakeman travelled to Clones, County Monaghan to discuss the subject with celebrated writer Patrick McCabe. Through the prism of McCabe's life and works in literature and film, captured across a series of filmed interviews and encounters, the film explores questions on historical and contemporary Anglo-Irish relations, Brexit and the future of Europe from an Irish perspective, the Irish-American experience and the development of Irish literature and cultural identity. In addition to interviews with McCabe the research team spoke with other artists and poets working 'on the border' both geographically and culturally to explore the legacy of the border's history and consider the implications of the ongoing Brexit process on local communities.

In April 2017 Stabb travelled to Pittsburgh to film a further series of interviews between Pat McCabe, Prof. Colin MacCabe and Jennifer Keating-Miller (Assistant Dean for Educational Initiatives, Department of English, Carnegie Mellon University). These conversations responded to the developing Brexit debate and sought to challenge the underrepresented voice from the Irish border. The film, made in an ongoing dialogue through the Brexit process, was edited in phases through 2017 and 2018 at Birkbeck College London. The process included a screening and workshop session at Birkbeck, with film academics and poets reviewing and responding to the raw material, providing feedback to Stabb and Prof. MacCabe. Stabb and Roth edited primary material from recordings with McCabe and MacCabe alongside film archive from Neil Jordan's 1997 adaptation of McCabe's *The Butcher Boy* (on which McCabe also collaborated, writing the screenplay) to explore the unique cultural atmosphere and perspective of the Irish border town that permeates McCabe's work. Final stages of post-production saw Stabb and Roth work with Dr. Andrew Knight-Hill to develop a sound mix that sought to use the audio-visual form of the research to create an evocative sound mix, integrating McCabe's intimate live musical performances with soundscapes that evoke the diverse and sometimes contradictory experiences of the border.

Europe Endless is a unique research document that provides a counterpoint to the Brexit discourse that during the opening two years of the post-referendum process largely ignored the political and cultural questions and challenges faced by communities at the Irish border. It provides fascinating insights and first-hand testimony concerning the historical imposition of a hard border. Stabb and collaborators use an audio-visual form to present personal and poetic responses to the political question of Brexit, Irish and European identity and the future border landscape adding significantly to the political debate and historical record of the period.

The film was screened as part of a Brexit Day The Border and Beyond programme on March 29th, 2019 by The Dublin International Film Festival, The Belfast Film Festival and The Clones Film Festival.

In this unique event buses left from Dublin and Belfast and journeyed to the border for a screening and Q and A. The film has also screened at The University of Pittsburgh and The Derek Jarman Lab, Birkbeck.
