## Variety Show - STEM the Tide

## [POETRY TAKEAWAY PERFORMANCE]

ANNOUNCER: Attention Deptford! Attention Deptford. The Environment Agency and the Met Office have issued the following Flood Warning:

MC:

MC:

OK where's Matt Damon when you need him eh? Who's seen the Martian? So the martian, starring matt damon

### COCO MALONE PERFORMANCE

MC: We've figured out that a storm surge is coming. The thames barrier - you all know about the thames barrier right?

Looks like a row of really butch tents?

The Thames Barrier was dreamed up a long time ago after the terrible floods of 1953. That was the first time we realised that we could be in trouble.

You see - London didn't always look like this. In fact,
Deptford is located on something we call a flood plain. And
you know what that is right? Its basically a flat piece of
land that floods if the tides get too high. In the olden days,
Deptford would have been under water most of the time, but
when London started being built up - they wanted to use the
land that was all a bit boggy and marshy, so they drained it,
and built big walls on the Thames to keep the river in a
narrow channel. The problem with a narrow channel is...well
water is a funny kind of thing...in fact - here's Dr Nate to
explain a bit more about how, if you try to contain water, you
could be doomed to being drenched!

MC:

So thanks Dr Nate - now I think we understand a little more about how the water works, and Sheila's explained how the tides work, but I still don't quite understand why we're going to have a flood NOW. Oh hang on, here's the voice of doom again....

ANNOUNCER: Attention Deptford! Attention Deptford. The Environment Agency and the Met Office have issued the following Flood Warning:

At 1500 hours today the water level of the River Thames is still rising rapidly. This is an emergency situation. Residents of SE8 are advised to evacuate immediately to avoid risk of injury, drowning and death.

MC:

Ooh-er, that all sounds a bit serious - I'm beginning to get a bit worried now. So - here are the facts.

AV: The idea of building the Thames Barrier was born after the floods of 1953. After many years in planning the barrier became operational for the first time in THE 1980S. Since then it has been closed 180 times in order to hold back flood waters that might threaten the rest of London with flooding. However, there's a problem - during that time, global warming

has been progressively melting our polar ice caps, and that is slowly raising our sea levels. 30 years agO we thought that THAT BARRIER would be enough. Now - we're not sure.

And there's another problem. We keep on building - and when we build we put concrete and tarmac and hard surfaces over lovely absorbent ground. Then when it rains there is nowhere for the rain to go. Trees are like sponges - they can soak it up, but cut down the trees and cover the ground with tarmac, the water just runs until it finds a place to go!

MC:

So what could happen if this flood hits? I'll tell you one thing... the Thames is home to a whole bunch of creatures who are going to be a bit closer to you than you might have wanted. But there's one person who really understand these animals - and the less pretty the better - its Simon Watt from the Ugly Underwater Animals Society!

MC

OK, thanks Simon. Uh-oh it's the Thames Barrier guy again ...

ANNOUNCER:

Right I'm actually beginning to feel like I ought to dig out my wellies at least now - so basically we've got ugly animals coming right up my estuary and I'm not even sure the Thames Barrier can save me anymore! What do you think we should do? Sometimes, when things look impossible, you need music to ground you

We know if it does, then the one thing we all need to do is make sure this can't happen again - resist building on grassland, reduce global warming by using your car less, anything you can do really.

MC

OK that's it - its time for the final update from the Thames

Barrier!

COCO:: end of the world song

ANNOUNCER: The flood is coming - the barrier has mostly held - we think Deptford is safe but the surge will reach you in 10,9,8,7,6...
